DON'T LEAVE A LEGACY of SUFFERING

CRUEL RESEARCH COULD BE PART FUNDED BY YOUR LEGACY

Many medical research charities, such as the British Heart Foundation (BHF) and Cancer Research UK (CRUK), fund experiments on animals that result in a great deal of suffering.

Such organisations are often highly dependent on legacies, with the BHF and CRUK both earning more income from this source than from any other.

Public opposition

76% of respondents in a YouGov opinion poll have said that they would be unlikely to knowingly leave money in their will to a charity that funds animal experiments. Yet such charities receive millions of pounds from the public in legacies. Our new campaign aims to bridge this stark gap in public awareness, asking people to pledge not to leave a legacy to any charity that funds vivisection.

Unforgiveable animal suffering

Animal Aid has exposed numerous experiments that have been supported by medical research charities which are heavily dependant on legacy income.

Supported numerous repulsive experiments, including dogs and pigs being deliberately given heart attacks and pregnant sheep being surgically mutilated and part suffocated.

Cancer Research UK

EARNED £169 MILLION FROM LEGACIES IN 2014-15 27% OF ITS TOTAL INCOME

Co-funded experiments in which furless, genetically modified mice were injected with human cancer cells, while another group of rodents were poisoned for around six months with an industrial chemical so that they would develop cancer.

ANIMAL RESEARCH BAD SCIENCE

As well as causing terrible suffering, animal experiments cannot be trusted, since they do not produce results that can be reliably translated to humans. In the laboratory, animals are physically injured or genetically modified, but these create only crude 'models' of human illnesses. This is illustrated by the fact that more than 700 drugs have been effective at treating stroke artificially induced in animals, but only two of these have been shown to work in humans.

Science without suffering

There are many valuable ways of conducting medical research that do not involve the use of animals. These include: the use of human cells and tissues, computer modelling, high-resolution scanning and organ-on-a-chip technology, as well as clinical studies on patients.



What will your legacy be?
